

WHO DO I TELL?

 If you test positive for an STI, anyone you had vaginal, anal or oral sex within the last 3 months needs to know, even if condoms were used

• STIs (sexually transmitted infections) are common infections passed on during sex

WHAT DO I TELL THEM?

- The name of the infection
- That they need to get checked and treated asap, even if there's no signs or symptoms
- That they need to tell the doctor or nurse they've had contact with someone who has chlamydia or gonorrhoea
- That these infections are easily treated, the sooner the better

WHY DO THEY NEED TO KNOW?

- They could spread the infection to others without even knowing
- Common infections like chlamydia and gonorrhoea often don't have any signs or symptoms
- They won't know if they have it unless they get checked.
- They need to get treated ASAP so they don't pass it onto someone else, or pass it back to you

WHEN SHOULD I TELL THEM?

 Tell them as soon as possible after finding out you have an infection, and before having sex with them again



HOW DO I TELL THEM?

You choose:

- Face-to-face
- Phone, email or message/ text

NEED SUPPORT? NO PROBLEM

- Your doctor or nurse can send out texts for you without using your name
- · Ask about this at the clinic



AVOID GETTING INFECTED AGAIN

- Finish taking ALL the tablets you're given
- NO sex for 7 days after your treatment
- Tell anyone you're having sex with now they need to get checked and treated
- Use condoms
 every time you
 have sex
- Get a re-test
 in 3 months

to make sure you haven't been infected again. You should get a text reminder from your clinic in 3 months - but put a reminder in your phone too

LOOK AFTER YOURSELF

- It's common to get infected again, even after treatment
- Infection can be passed from someone who hasn't been treated or doesn't know they have it
- Getting infected more than once can be more harmful and could stop you having kids in the future
- Always use condoms free or cheap from a clinic
- Get regular STI checks, so you get the treatment you need asap

WHERE DO I GO?

- Medical centre or GP clinic
- Sexual health clinic
- Family Planning clinic
- Youth health clinic
- School clinic

WHAT WILL IT COST?

Often free if you're under 25, but not always. Ask the clinic receptionist when you call or drop in
